"The Status of Commercialized Bt Brinjal in Bangladesh" by

Bhagirath Choudhary, K.M. Nasiruddin and Kadambini Gaur New Delhi, India and Mymensingh, Bangladesh ISAAA Brief No. 47-2014

It is a pleasure to share a complimentary copy of the most recent Brief, published by ISAAA on the status of commercialized Bt brinjal in Bangladesh. Brief 47 presents a thorough review and analysis of the deregulation of Bt brinjal—from the scientific and biosafety assessment and commercial release to the planting of Bt brinjal by farmers in Bangladesh. It encapsulates the testimonials of experts and farmers attesting to the benefits of Bt brinjal after a bountiful harvest in the first cropping season of 2014.
