


The legislation will abolish the treatment of GMOs as New Organisms


The new legislation is to be modelled on the Australian Gene

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
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
For regulated organisms, a risk-tiering system is proposed, with varying levels of Regulator oversight and involvement.






#### **Some differences to OGTR Australia**






A Māori Advisory Committee will assist the new regulator regarding their views on gene technology, particularly regarding valued (taonga) species in New Zealand.

• The new legislation is expected to ease regulations regarding field tests of organisms modified by gene technology in New Zealand.


The legislation is planned to be fully operational by early 2026.
